We will be "in business" until there is a home waiting for every cat or dog that

is born.

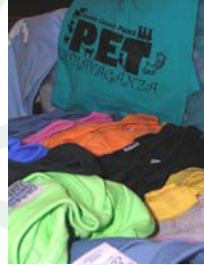

Excitement is in the air every year at this time! There is so much to experience at holiday time, so much to do with our families, so much to get done, and always so many cats and kittens to care for at the PAWS Adoption Center. For these reasons, I wanted to offer up a Four Paws Salute to all of the cat program volunteers who graciously offer their precious time, energy, and funds to provide loving care for our PAWS cats! Our volunteers work 7 days a week all year long to clean, medicate, groom, transport, observe, fundraise, promote, follow up on cat applications, and most important of all....they LOVE, foster, cuddle, console, talk to, and protect the cats and kittens in our care. Thank you to each and every "cat person"!

At any given time, we have around 35 cats and kittens in our system, with scores more patiently waiting on a list to come into our program and find their place in their forever home. Diane Casher, our cat foster home coordinator, has done an exceptional job this year getting as many cats as possible into foster homes. Not only do the cats get much-deserved personal care, but we learn so much more about our cats from our dedicated foster families. That extra information helps us to make more precise matches between families and cats. Personalities and habits cannot be fully evaluated when a cat spends all of its time at the adoption center. With the PAWS holiday break coming, our adoption center will close down from December 19 - January 6. Finally, I have a very important request for your help on behalf of

three of our special needs cats. That request is to ask for your help in spreading the word about the following cats, and help us to get them placed with the perfect family. The two males are in wonderful foster homes during the week, but the older female is spending all of her time at the Center. Our senior gal, Ms. Kisses, is about 12 years old, a light grey tabby, still playful, and is the sweetest, most gentle cat! Each of her two previous owners has had to give her up because they lost their abilities to care for her. Other than getting a bit chunky for lack of exercise at the Center, she has no health problems and is only "special needs" due to her more advanced age. There is a lot more life left in this great cat! The older of the two males, Saint, is about 9 years old, has a handsome grey coat, and gets around very well on his three legs. He is missing his left front leg, but his foster mom says that doesn't inhibit him at all in any activities. He is happy, gentle, well adjusted, and follows her around her apartment like a dog...talking, yet! Moxie is a young, handsome, friendly, black and white cat that had to have his tail amputated due to a neurological irritation along the length of it. He has been doing great in his foster home, but cries and protests when he is put in a cage at PAWS on weekends to be shown. He is so smart that he knows to look forward to Sundays at 4pm when he can go "home". But, he needs a forever home.

PAWS & CLAWS—UNDERSTANDING SCRATCHING BEHAVIOR

Cats are born with claws, and scratching is a natural cat behavior. Claws aid in balance and serve as a first line of defense in times of trouble. Scratching removes the dead husks from the claws, stretches the cat's muscles, and allows your cat to mark its territory, both visually and with scent from the glands in its paws. The latter is the cat's way of saying "Kilroy Was Here!"

Nail trimming, about every two weeks or so, is essential. Buy a good nail clipper designed especially for cats and ask either your veterinarian or a PAWS volunteer to show you how to properly trim your cat's nails. Make it a habit from the beginning, reward your cat with praise and a small treat when the job is done, and he'll get used to it over time. It may be a two-person job at first, maybe forever, so make sure you have an able assistant.

If you don't want your cat to claw your furniture or other household items, buy something acceptable for him to scratch on. Scratchers come in a variety of "models" (vertical posts, ramps, flat on the floor) and with a choice of surfaces (carpet, sisal or hemp, corrugated cardboard). An old tree stump or small log may do just fine. It may take a little experimentation to find out which device your cat likes best, and maybe you'll need to invest in two or three. It's worth it if you want to save your furniture. Whatever you buy, make sure that the scratcher is sturdy enough that kitty won't knock it over or push it along the floor. A corrugated cardboard ramp called the "Cosmic Catnip Alpine Scratcher" has proven to be very popular with PAWS cats, but you must fill the bottom of it with a couple of bricks or rocks to keep it

from scooting out from under the cat.

Attract your cat to the scratcher by rubbing catnip on it. Train him by playing with him at the scratcher. Wand toys are perfect for this and, of course, you'll want to reward kitty verbally and with a treat when he begins to vigorously scratch the device. Make time several times a day for this "training" and within a few days, kitty will get the picture! If you catch kitty in the act of scratching your couch, move the scratcher next to where he's scratching, gently move kitty to the scratcher and proceed with the training in that location. Eventually you'll be able to move the scratcher, perhaps in stages, to where you want it. There are deterrents you can spray or tack on to forbidden surfaces. Bitter Apple, available in pet supply stores, sometimes works, or try double-sided tape, "Sticky Paws" strips available online, or strips of foil. Although cats may avoid these "turn offs", we find that in general, they respond more quickly to positives (teaching and praising for using acceptable scratchers) than to negatives.

To Declaw or Not to Declaw?

So instead of worrying about nail trimming, scratchers and training your cat to claw where you want it to, why not just have the cat declawed? Declawing is a highly controversial topic among cat owners, shelter workers and veterinarians in the United States, with many veterinarians actually promoting declawing as part of the package of services offered to new cat owners. In Great Britain and many other countries, the declawing of cats is illegal.

Declawing is of absolutely no benefit to your cat, so the decision to put him or her through this surgery should not be made without fully understanding the procedure, its possible complications and long-term effects. Declawing is simply the removal of the cat's claws, right? WRONG. Declawing is a surgical amputation of the cat's toes at the last joint. Nails and portions of bone are removed. Recovery can be extremely painful and complications such as infection and hemorrhage are not uncommon. Although use of a laser to perform the surgery has reportedly reduced post-surgical complications and may be less painful for the cat, only a few local veterinary practices currently offer this as an option. Laser surgery is considerably more expensive than the standard procedure. Long-term effects of declawing have not been documented scientifically, but anecdotal evidence of both physical and behavioral consequences abounds.

Although the opinions of individual PAWS volunteers differ on the subject, PAWS organizational policy is this: a cat will be released to a person or family who plans to have it declawed ONLY if the cat is younger than 2 yrs., weighs less than 10 lbs., and has no known health or behavioral history that may be aggravated by declawing. Most PAWS volunteers and more and more people in the national veterinary community have come to view declawing as a last resort. If an adopter considers declawing a must, for whatever reason, we strongly urge him or her to adopt a cat that already has been declawed. A declawed cat should NEVER be allowed outside!

KEEP YOUR PETS SAFE THIS WINTER

Winter and the holidays can be lots of fun for pets and their people. But there are extra dangers this time of year for your pet.

Inside Dangers

Christmas trees: place non-breakable ornaments on the bottom branches; avoid using tinsel which is easily ingested; make sure lights are tightly wrapped and unplug when you are not around to supervise;

secure your tree to the wall or ceiling; don't add chemicals to tree water

Be careful if you use ribbons on packages—they can be easily swallowed and cause serious problems.

Keep holiday plants like poinsettias out of reach.

Secure your pets if you are having a holiday party. This will keep them from slipping out

when guests arrive/leave or getting into rich food that can cause vomiting or diarrhea.

Outside Dangers

If your pet spends time outside, be sure he has a warm, dry place to get out of the weather and a water supply that won't freeze.

Wipe your pet's feet when she comes inside to remove snow, ice, and any chemicals she may

have walked in.

Antifreeze has a sweet taste that attracts animals and is a very serious threat to your pet's life. If your pet ingests antifreeze, seek medical attention immediately. Treatment must be administered shortly after ingestion to be effective.

Pets can suffer from hypothermia too. Watch for excessive shivering, lethargy and cold skin.
